You will investigate a range of issues that reverberate within and beyond Clark's campus including human rights, elections, and globalization. In line with our focus on action-based learning, you will collaborate with faculty members and peers to drive positive change through your research, internships, and service projects, at home and abroad.

What can I do with my major?

JOBS & EMPLOYERS

Political science majors graduate prepared for careers in the public, nonprofit, and private sectors, including positions in local, state, and national government, in international and community organizations, and in business, journalism, and education. Graduates work at institutions including Congress, the UN Development Programme, and the Economic Progress Institute.

GRADUATE PROGRAMS

Alumni pursue advanced study in public policy, international relations, law, and more at top schools including Harvard Law School, Georgetown University, Johns Hopkins, and Columbia.

Foundational Courses

The department has three subfields; students must take at least one class in each subfield and declare a specialization in one. These subfields are:

- American Politics and Public Policy: the analysis of the U.S. political system in all its complexity.
- Comparative Politics: the analysis
 of the trends in and workings of the
 political systems of the world's more
 than 190 countries.
- International Relations: the analysis of political, economic, social, and cultural dynamics across the international system.

Year 1



Explore the Political Science department

Talk with department faculty and staff about your interests and plans. Look into First-Year Intensive (FYI) courses. Meet with an adviser to start identifying courses that match your interests and goals.



Get connected

Learn about and get involved with student clubs and activities that resonate with you. Consider applying to the Clark chapter of Pi Sigma Alpha, the national political science honor society.

Year 3



Delve deeper

Take a seminar in a program area you have not tried. Explore if graduate school is right for you with resources from the Career Connections Center. Consider applying for the 4+1 Accelerated Master's Degree and connect with program advisers.

Dive into research

Complete your capstone through a course project, research experience, or honors thesis. Make sure you are on track to complete all major requirements and wrap up any research projects.
